JERUSALEM (Israeli Sector), May 27-Premier Ben-Gurion

has promised a "show" trial for Eichmann to give the world the whole story of the Nazi attempt

to exterminate European Jews. In a letter to Israel Galili, a

member of the Knesset (Parsaid Premier liament). the

"world public opinion should learn the truth." A passage from the letter was published in today's editions of Davar, the newspaper of Histadrut, Israel's

general labor federation. The Premier wrote:

"The facts should be known and remembered by the youth of Israel, who have grown up and received their education after the holocaust and only a faint echo of that atrocious crime, unparalleled in history,

has reached their ears." Mr. Ben-Gurion also wrote that the trial would inform the world that Arabs who plot the destruction of Israel are disciples of the Nazis.

Some Secrecy Expected

In spite of Mr. Ben-Gurion's letter not many persons here expect that all of the trial will be open to the press and public. There are too many aspects of the case that the Israeli Government and perhaps others will want kept secret.
