

On Sunday November 9, the <u>Voice/Vision Archive</u>, along with the <u>Mardigian Library</u>, will co-sponsor a talk by Glenn Kurtz, author of *Three Minutes in Poland: Discovering a Lost World in a 1938 Family Film*, as part of the 63rd Annual Jewish Community Center of Metropolitan Detroit's Book Fair.

Kurtz's book tells the story of his grandfather, who traveling in Europe in 1938, captured 3 minutes of ordinary life in the small, predominantly Jewish town of Nasielsk, Poland. More than 70 years later, these few minutes become a memorial to an entire community annihilated in the Holocaust. For Marcy Rosen, the film clip was also a visual record of her grandfather as a young boy living in Nasielsk prior to the war:
